Please remember that screenings are required for entrance into Kindergarten.




This Month in the Library...

The past 8 weeks were busy for students in STEAM class grades k-3 during the first round of specials!!

Kindergarten learned about animals and their habitats, did research during stations, programmed BeeBot Robot, completed Lego build challenges, and created their own animal out of clay and designed a habitat for that animal.

First grade students learned about insects and spiders. They built spider webs, participated in research stations, completed Lego build challenges, programmed BeeBot Robot, and created a "new" insect based off of what they learned about insect along with describing their new insect's habitat.

Second graders learned about biomes. They participated in research stations, completed Lego build challenges, programmed Dash Robot, completed Minecraft challenges, and designed and built a boat to rescue their stranded Minion.

Third grade students learned about extreme weather. They participated in research stations, completed Lego build challenges, programmed Dash robot, completed Minecraft challenges, and designed and built houses to withstand hurricanes. The second round of specials started on October 24.


