Freshmen/Sophomores:

- ☐ Keep your grades up! Your Grade Point Average (GPA) and ACT/SAT scores are the two most important factors in college admission.
- Meet with your guidance counselor to discuss classes and available activities.
- ☐ Use www.careercruising.com to research potential careers. (Username: Ric-your student number; Password: Date of Birth (with leading zeros)). Note: Don't forget the hyphen between Ric and your student number).
- Plan which classes to take for the next four years.
 Challenge yourself to take more difficult courses.

- Use <u>www.khanacademy.org</u> to prepare for the PSAT or <u>www.number2.com</u> to prepare for the ACT.
- □ Take the PSAT 8/9 and PSAT 10.
- Join clubs and activities in your area of interest.
 Take leadership positions when possible.
- Start building relationships with your favorite teachers, counselors and activity advisors who can write recommendations and serve as mentors later.
- Discuss saving for college with your parents/family.
- Search for scholarships on www.careercruising.com and www.fastweb.com.
- Research and attend summer programs in your area of interest.

Juniors:

- Keep your grades up! Your Grade Point Average (GPA) and ACT/SAT scores are the two most important factors in college admission.
- Take the most challenging courses you can. Doing so will show admissions offices that you can compete on a college level.
- ☐ Research prospective careers/colleges. Use <u>www.careercriusing.com</u> (Username: Ric-your student number; Password: Date of Birth (with leading zeros)). Note: Don't forget the hyphen between Ric and your student number).
- □ Visit prospective colleges' web sites.
- □ Meet with college representatives visiting RHS.
- □ Attend college fairs and speak to campus reps.
- □ Explore financial aid options and college planning with your parents/family.
- □ Register, prepare for, and take the PSAT.
- Use <u>www.khanacademy.org</u> to prepare for the PSAT and SAT or <u>www.number2.com</u> to prepare for the ACT.
- □ Take SAT/ACT prep classes.
- Go to <u>www.careercruising.com</u> and <u>www.fastweb.com</u> to search for scholarships.

- □ Take leadership roles in clubs, activities and other volunteer and service organizations.
- □ Take the SAT/ACT in the spring.
- Strengthen your relationship with teachers, advisors, or counselors whom you may want to have write your recommendations.

Special Situations

If you think you might qualify for an athletic scholarship, you must register with the NCAA Eligibility Center your Junior Year. Here is a timeline of things to do for this:

What Do I Need To Do?

• Grade 9

 Verify with your high school guidance counselor and the online core-course listing to make sure you are on track.

• Grade 10

 Verify with your high school guidance counselor and the online core-course listing to make sure you are on track.

• Grade 11

- o Register with the eligibility center.
- Make sure you are still on course to meet core-course requirements (verify you have the correct number of core courses and that the core courses are on your high school's 48-H with the eligibility center).
- After your junior year, go to www.parchment.com to have your high school guidance counselor send a copy of your transcript. If you have attended any other high schools, make sure a transcript is sent to the eligibility center from each high school.
- When taking the ACT or SAT, request test scores to be sent to the eligibility center (the code is "9999").
- Begin your amateurism questionnaire.

Grade 12

- When taking the ACT or SAT, request test scores to be sent to the eligibility center (the code is "9999").
- Complete amateurism questionnaire and sign the final authorization signature online on or after April 1 if you are expecting to enroll in college in the fall semester. (If you are expecting to enroll

- for spring semester, sign the final authorization signature on or after October 1 of the year prior to enrollment.)
- Use <u>www.parchment.com</u> to have your high school guidance counselor send a final transcript with proof of graduation to the eligibility center.
